Special Town Board Meeting 1 MR. HOFMEISTER: Good 2 evening. We'd like to call this 3 meeting to order. If you would 4 all rise, we'll have our Madam 5 Clerk lead us in the Pledge of 6 Allegiance. 7 (Pledge of Allegiance.) 8 MR. HOFMEISTER: I'd ask 9 that you remain standing, and have 10 a round of applause for all the 11 troops around the world. 12 (Applause.) 13 MR. HOFMEISTER: Okay, good 14 evening, and welcome to the public 15 forum on the Ronkonkoma 16 Transportation Hub. At this time, 17 I'd like to turn the meeting over 18 to Councilman Flotteron for some 19 brief comments. 20 Councilman? 21 MR. FLOTTERON: Thank you. 22 I want to thank everybody 23 for joining us this evening for 24 this public forum about the 25

Ronkonkoma Transportation Hub
project. We realize tonight's
weather was less than ideal, and
we are sincerely grateful that
everybody was still able to make
it out tonight in this icy
weather, so please be safe going
home, but this is a very
significant project, so again, we
are grateful you were all able to
make it here.

The purpose of tonight is
to provide opportunity for our
Islip residents to weigh in on
this project and have their
comments on the record. It is an
extremely significant multifaceted
plan that will greatly impact
residents, businesses, schools and
public services in both Brookhaven
and Islip towns.

The opinions of you, our residents, are important, and we as a Board believe that this forum

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Special Town Board Meeting will ensure that your thoughts are included on behalf of the comments our town will submit as part of the DGEIS comment period.

The area in question encompasses almost 54 acres surrounding a busy Ronkonkoma train station. And while the Town of Islip has no jurisdiction over this project in terms of regulating the land use, approval of zoning requirements and beyond, this Town Board understands that we do not have an obligation to ensure -- well, this Town Board does understand, we want to make sure our residents have their voices on the record about our concerns on our side of the tracks.

This is why we've organized this forum, to give our residents opportunities to publically ask questions, express thoughts and

Special Town Board Meeting 1 become more informed. I know 2 myself, as a Board member, most of 3 the information I've been getting 4 about this project is really 5 through the papers. I saw in the 6 Newsday on January 14th, the 7 Brookhaven planning commissioner, 8 Tullio Bertoli, he told the 9 council, the Planning Council of 10 Suffolk County, that in the four 11 years he's been involved in the 12 developing of this Ronkonkoma Hub 13 proposal, public outreach has been 14 part of the process. He said 15 there is civic support, Suffolk 16 County support and Town of Islip 17 support. Well, I can just say for 18 myself, I am not saying I support 19 or don't support anything; I just 20 haven't seen it yet, and that's 21 what this meeting is supposed to 2.2 be about. 23 Our planning commissioner, 24 Rich Zapolski, invited the master 25

2	developer, TRITEC, and Brookhaven
3	Planning Commissioner Tullio
4	Bertoli, but they declined. Part
5	of TRITEC's response was "We are
6	in receipt of your request to
7	attend this" "the public forum,
8	but must respectfully decline.
9	This project is a Town of
10	Brookhaven initiative, and it
11	seems appropriate that any input
12	that Islip has should be addressed
13	to the Town Board."
14	The Brookhaven Town Board
15	is the lead agency on this major
16	redevelopment project. We ask
17	each and every elected official in
18	Brookhaven to carefully consider
19	the thoughts of our residents
20	raised during this evening's
21	public forum in an effort to
22	implement the Ronkonkoma
23	Transportation Hub in a
24	responsible manner that takes all
25	interested parties into

And again, I just know, myself trying to get some type of information, I feel it's sometimes like a fishing expedition. just found out when reading this last night, the supplementary DGEIS, there's -- part of the planning of track area, there's 900 cars that will be placed on the south side of the tracks in Islip. And again, what, you know, the residents of Islip, what road improvements are needed and everything else? We need to have this public discussion.

So, again, I want to thank all of you for your attendance.
You are invited to fill out the speaker cards, and we are allotting three minutes speaking time per resident. And also, if you don't want to speak, but you want to have things on the record,

Special Town Board Meeting 1 we have up here (indicating), you 2 can put down your comments and 3 name and address, and there's also 4 some at the table and at the front 5 door. 6 Again, thank you for 7 coming, and we're here to listen 8 and learn. 9 Thank you. 10 MR. HOFMEISTER: At this 11 time, I would like to ask Rich 12 Zapolski, our planning 13 commissioner, to make a 14 presentation to the audience. 15 Welcome, Rich. 16 MR. ZAPOLSKI: Thank you. 17 If everyone doesn't mind, I 18 am going to remain seated so I can 19 run the PowerPoint presentation, 20 but my name is Rich Zapolski. 21 am a civil engineer, and I am the 22 Commissioner of Planning and 23 Development for the Town of Islip. 24 I've been in that role for about 25

three-and-a-half months now.

I am familiar with this

project; I am familiar with some

of the inception of this project.

I grew up in Bohemia, so I am

familiar with the area. I'm a

Connetquot graduate, so I know the area very well.

I put a brief presentation together just to get us warmed up on the project and started. meet and speak with the planning commissioner from Brookhaven. was very helpful in pointing out areas where I can get the latest and greatest information on the project. I have collected some of the information that is copied for us here (indicating). I have electronic copies downstairs. brought as much as I can, and I will do just a brief presentation to get us warmed up.

So the intention of tonight

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Special Town Board Meeting is to listen to the concerns of the Islip residents, to identify potential impacts in the Town of Islip, and to identify possible mitigation measures to these impacts.

And what we'll do tomorrow, or over the next two days, I'll say, is provide unedited comments to the Town of Brookhaven prior to the end of their public comment period. So they are in the process of completing their Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement, and the public comment period ends on February 10th. So, this is our opportunity to get our comments on the record with them, and that's what we'll be doing over the next couple of days.

This is the study area (indicating). You can see -- I know it's a little dark, but there's a red line surrounding the

Special Town Board Meeting area. You can see north of the tracks is the area that we are talking about, south of the tracks is the parking lot for the Ronkonkoma train station. That is in the Town of Islip, and it's under the County's jurisdiction. The road to the south on the south side of this picture is Railroad Avenue, and we have Hawkins to the left, which is Smithtown Avenue on our side.

This (indicating) is the conceptual land use plan that was put together by Brookhaven. It pretty much indicates the areas.

What this does is it divides it up into -- the orange areas are residential; the green areas are vertical mixed use, where they get some height in those buildings in those green areas. The maximum story buildings are the dark blue closest to the tracks, and it has

some five-story buildings in those locations; and the red areas are horizontal mixed use, which include residential and offices.

So you can just get a feel for how they planned out the space with the road network and where they anticipate putting residential uses adjacent to residentials, and the more intense uses closer to the tracks and the train station.

what they did was they developed the entire site to just get a feel for what the maximum density of that area would be if they built out to their land use plan. So, if you take a look at this (indicating), this is divided up into the stories that the buildings will be. Not that you can tell, but this building over here (indicting) is light blue. That's a one-story building. The

yellow buildings are two-story.

Those pink buildings up on the top and left-hand side of this are three stories; the blue buildings that you see clearly are four-story; and the green buildings on this plan are five-story.

Now, this is a potential plan. It's not necessarily how it will be built out, but it does give an indication of if this property was built out to its maximum density, this is something it could look like.

If you want to say the Commissioner of Planning in Brookhaven did a really great job in laying out the buildings and doing some shadow studies and seeing where the higher buildings would make more sense. He has many sketch plans in his presentation. I don't know how

Special Town Board Meeting 1 many people were able to be at 2 Brookhaven for his presentations, 3 but he did go through all of those hand sketches. With that maximum 5 development plan that we just 6 looked at, those densities look 7 like this (indicating); 1,450 8 residential units; 195,000 square 9 feet of retail; 360,000 square 10 feet of office and medical space; 11 60,000 square feet of flex space, 12 which includes hospitality, 13 conference, exhibition and/or 14 residential, according to their 15 report; and about 3,638 new 16 parking spaces. That's in 17 addition to about 1,000 spaces 18 that are there now. 19 The sewage treatment plant 20 is proposed on the Islip side of 21 the tracks on a Suffolk County 22 owned piece of property. The Town 23 did reserve some flow to that 24 treatment plant. From what I

Special Town Board Meeting 1 understand, the DPW is considering 2 an alternate connection to the 3 Southwest Sewer District. We have 4 yet to have a full conversation 5 with commissioner of DPW, Gilbert 6 Anderson, and we will be getting 7 more information on that in the 8 next couple days. 9 Just for a comparison, we 10 have two mixed-use-type 11 developments we've been looking at 12 on the Islip side for a long time, 13 but to compare this project with 14 those projects, what I've done is 15 I've just took a look at two quick 16 metrics. The first metric is how 17 many residential units per acre of 18 property. 19 So, Ronkonkoma Hub has 20 1,450 residential units maximum 21 planned over 54 acres; it's about 22 27 units per acre. In Islip 23 Pines, there's 350 residential

units proposed on 143 acres;

that's about two-and-a-half units
per acre, and on Heartland,
there's 9,000 residential units
proposed -- again, it's very
conceptual -- on 452 acres; that's
about 20 units per acre. So you
can just get a sense of how many
residential units for the property
area that that is.

The second metric I took a look at was how much building area per acre of property. So the Ronkonkoma Hub has about 2,000,000-square-foot of building on 54 acres. That's a density of about 38,000 square feet per acre. If you look at Islip Pines, that's also about 2,000,000-square-foot of buildings on 143 acres. That's about 14,000-square-foot per acre. Keep in mind that an acre is about 43,000 square feet. And Heartland is about 13,000,000 square feet proposed there, on 452 acres; so

that's about 30,000-square-foot
per acre. So that's just to give
us a feel of what we're looking at
on the paper.

So as planning commissioner one of the things I look at is what are going to be some of the impacts on the Islip side that I'd So I took a be concerned with. look at the traffic study. civil engineer, so I have a familiarity and comfortability with the traffic studies, and I know this area pretty well. I noticed is that the intersections that were studied in the draft version of the plan are mostly in Brookhaven. Actually, I think they are all in Brookhaven.

So what I said to myself was, "Okay, if I'm in Islip and I'm going to go up to the Hub to dine, or that's where I work, how am I going to travel up there?"

3	Highway to Lakeland, and normally

12	light, if I need another turning	
13	lane, if I need to widen it a

16	I get that mitigation into the	
17	thoughts of the people who are	
18	putting the impact study together.	
19	So, that's one intersection.	_
20	The other intersection that	
21	I was concerned with was going up	
22	Ocean Avenue, where Ocean crosses	
23	Johnson, where the 7-Eleven is.	F2
24	That's a major thoroughfare that	
25	would go right into the Hub, but	

Special Town Board Meeting 1 that intersection wasn't really 2 studied. And where Pond Road 3 crosses, there's also a signal 4 there. It's much less of a 5 Cont'd. signal, but it's a signal 6 nonetheless. And then, if we 7 consider a lot of that traffic 8 will go up to the Expressway, what happens where Ocean Avenue crosses 10 the Expressway, I'd like to see if 11 there's an impact on that 12 intersection as well. 13 So what we might do is ask 14 Brookhaven to take a look at those 15 intersections to see how much 16 traffic is going to be increased 17 at those intersections; do we need 18 an additional landing, do we need 19 an additional head, do we need to 20 upgrade the equipment there, is 21 there an impact on Islip? 22 I just want to note on here 23 (indicating), too, the blue line 24 F3 is Brookhaven. So you can see 25

that the southwest corner of
Brookhaven is right where Pond
Road and Johnson cross, so what
this tells me is that, you know,
two sides of the Hub project
are -- you know, are impacting
Islip, so we really have to take a
look at how the project does lead
and affect that side.

I've only talked about Ronkonkoma so far. I still want to take a look at what's going on on the Holbrook side, because I have Railroad Avenue, you know, south of the tracks into Holbrook, and we all know that people in Holbrook use that route to get the back way into the train station. And if there's going to be more attractions on the north side of the track, I'm sure some of the traffic patterns are going to change in that area, where Holbrook residents that are in

Islip might cross the tracks and

come over from that direction. So

I want to take a look at the

signalized intersections there and

see how that area is impacted.

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Something I learned yesterday, this (indicating) is the parking lot on Islip side. You can see all the cars. On the north side of the tracks, there are some parking lots that are shown as buildings on the plan. So, one of the things that they identified in the study is that there will be some displaced parking. And what we noticed is in this figure, the red areas on the north side of the tracks are areas that will be displaced, and we're noticing they will be displaced to the wooded area on the south that are under County control. And not that that's a bad idea for the planning concept,

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Special Town Board Meeting but we really want to take a look at if there's a thousand parking spaces that were once on that side of the tracks and they will now be on our side of the tracks, what's the impact on our roads and our Do we need to add intersections? a lane to the road? Are we going to have pavement that is going to So there might wear out quicker? be some mitigation measures that we'd like to see in the report as an impact of that development.

The last parts of this slide are the conceptual renderings that are included in the Planning Commissioner of Brookhaven's presentation. These are just kind of the pictures of the three-, four- and five-story buildings, what the area will look like. I don't know if everyone had the opportunity to see the Brookhaven presentation, but

Tullio was kind enough to provide
those to us, and I'm just going to
peel through those real quick.

This (indicating) is kind of a view of some of the streetscape. These (indicating) are three-story buildings. It looks like they have residences above, and some type of mixed use below, whether it's retail or restaurant use.

This (indicating) starts to get into some four-story looks.

The tower there (indicating) is about five stories. You can see the plaza area for the public.

This (indicating) is part of the four- and five-story area as well.

You can see some of the streetscapes that they are proposing. This (indicating) streetscape is three stories on the right-hand side, four stories on the left-hand side. You can

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Special Town Board Meeting get a sense of scale.

These (indicating) are some of the residential units that are three stories, and another concept (indicating) for some of the three stories, and finally, this last picture, on the left-hand side, it's going to be a view from our side of the tracks over to the Brookhaven development. So you can see on the left-hand side, you can see where it's developed; on the right-hand side you can see the familiar parking lot that we have on the south side of the That needs some tracks. attention, I would say.

And that concludes my brief presentation just giving us a feel. I wanted to warm people up to the project. What I'm really interested in doing is collecting everyone's concerns, getting them on the record, and being able to

Special Town Board Meeting 1 deliver them timely to Brookhaven. 2 So, if you use your time wisely at 3 the microphone, I think we'll be 4 able to get a lot of comments over 5 to the town. 6 Thank you. 7 (Applause.) 8 At this MR. HOFMEISTER: 9 point, I will ask if there are any 10 comments or questions from the 11 Board for Mr. Zapolski? 12 MR. COCHRANE: Yes. 13 Commissioner, one thing 14 that pops up right off the bat 15 which hasn't been addressed is has 16 the FAA been contacted about the 17 height of these buildings. On the 18 Islip side we're always concerned 19 about the height of the corridor 20 about having two-story buildings. 21 F6 Why on the same distance away in 22 Brookhaven is it they can have a 23 five-story? The FAA controls that 24 area; correct? 25

22	questions up here tonight, we're
23	kind of limited in the ability to
24	answer all of them. Richard is
25	going to do his best, but this is

11	questions to Brookhaven as you are
12	going to be asking tonight.
13	I just wanted to make sure
14	everybody was clear on that.

Special Town Board Meeting 1 for this forum getting out of 2 control, and with that, I will 3 call up the first person that 4 signed up, Artie Cipoletti? 5 MR. A. CIPOLETTI: Correct. 6 MR. HOFMEISTER: Sir, name 7 and address for the record, and 8 again, just a reminder, three 9 minutes to speak. 10 MR. A. CIPOLETTI: Artie 11 Cipoletti, 27 True Harbor Way, 12 West Islip, New York. 13 I live in the Town of 14 Islip, my main office is in the 15 Town of Islip, and I am very 16 familiar with it. I am also 17 thankful to the Board for having 18 this forum tonight. I'm very 19 surprised that the opening 20 comments that the Town would say 21 that they are just learning 22 information from reading the 23 Newsday, because when they had a 24 public hearing, that means 25

Special Town Board Meeting 1 everybody is invited, and all that 2 information is available. 3 And then along the way, 4 too, there was a comment that 5 TRITEC was invited to come here to 6 speak, but obviously they already 7 had their statements read into the 8 public record, so for them to come 9 here to speak would be detrimental 10 to the job, so I would respect 11 that they made the right decision 12 in not attending this. 13 That said, I have about 60 14 employees that live and work 15 within the Town. They work for 16 I own several pieces of real 17 estate within the Town of Islip. 18 I love it here, and I see this as 19 a very positive thing for the Town 20 of Islip to be part of. 21 I prepared a little brief 22

I prepared a little brief statement. I'm here in support of the Ronkonkoma Hub project and the developer, TRITEC. They have

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Special Town Board Meeting 1 proven themselves to be 2 visionaries and quality builders 3 who adapt to the needs of the 4 areas they work in. It's proven. 5 Their most recent project 6 in Patchoque is an example of 7 quality construction and renewal 8 to an area that was in desperate 9 That area in need of it. 10 Ronkonkoma is blighted. There's 11 no doubt that it needs it, and you 12 have chosen the right people to 13 spearhead that movement. 14 I fully expect the same 15 result for this Ronkonkoma 16 expansion. The project will put 17 Ronkonkoma back on the map as a 18 destination location, and provide 19 much needed housing for our youth. 20 I strongly encourage you to 21 support them in their efforts and 22 be part of the revitalization of 23 24 that area.

12	footage, but it's true relevance.
13	I'm not sure about how much really
14	it's relevant, considering none of
15	these jobs are built at this time,
16	and none of them you know, it's
17	all conceptual. We're here to
18	listen and learn. I'm for the
19	project. I encourage the Town
20	Board to be for this project also.

24	Thank you, sir.
25	Our next speaker is Bud

Special Town Board Meeting 1 Cipoletti. We will keep it in the 2 family to start. 3 MR. B. CIPOLETTI: Bud 4 Cipoletti. I live at 970 Main 5 Street in West Islip, New York. 6 I'm here tonight generally (a) in support of the project, but 8 (b) more as part of the concerned 9 youth of Long Island. It's good 10 there's a lot of young faces here 11 tonight. I was at the Brookhaven 12 hearing, and there was no young 13 faces whatsoever. 14 Everybody knows that if we 15 don't have work, there's really 16 not too much options on Long 17 Island as far as moving forward in 18 life. I'm currently 25 years old. 19 I'm on the cusp of trying to 20 create a career. Places like this 21 make me take a step back when I 22

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look at the concepts. Long Island

should be a place of evolution for

people like us who graduated right

in the middle of a recession. So as I come out of trying to struggle and scrape and make a living for myself, trying to come into my prime business-wise, I like to see projects like this even brought up in public forums like this. It gives me a chance to maybe have some work, start a family, to have the same opportunities all you guys have had to have a family in the Town of Islip.

Generally, construction I

see wanting to move eastward on

Long Island as it sprawls, and

this is one sprawl that is deemed

as a regionally significant

project. I hope that everybody is

careful as this project develops,

but most of all, I hope this

project I see happening in the

very near future, so thank you for

These mixed-use urban development projects, or Hubs, are geared toward centralizing and making more affordable the American dream right here in our backyard. They have been sprouting up all over the country in the last five to ten years.

Long Island has always been home to the Levittown development mentality. During today's times, in an area where it is too expensive to live, that model doesn't apply. The Hub will serve to attract not only young couples,

but also an older generation who
maybe want to sell their home and
retire and stay right here on Long
Island, and enjoy all the
amenities that the Hub has to
offer. Those seniors can downsize
to a smaller house, enjoy the
ability to live close to a rail

This project, in scope and size, is very similar to other projects. More specifically, the new village at Patchogue or Bartone Plaza in Farmingdale, and these retirees can be secure in knowing that they can still enjoy retirement on Long Island.

This particular project has many benefits, such as major access to transportation choices, revitalizing a deteriorating area, the addition of all permanent and temporary jobs, and revenue streams for tax collection.

I just want to say, I was previously -- the previous Ronkonkoma Civic Association, I was vice president for 25 years, and for those 25 years I was involved and saw the controlled growth that the Civic Association in the Town recommended and worked together with the Civics, and controlled growth during those boom-time years of the late '80s from West Equi-Park to the Foreign Trade Zone through the early '90s, I was very involved. I saw Ocean Avenue and Lakeland Avenue get widened, I saw Johnson Avenue get

18	project will have an adverse
19	effect for the residents of
20	Ronkonkoma. Due to the form-based F34 Cont'd.
21	zoning that is used by the Town of
22	Brookhaven on this project, it
23	will have a density that is much
24	greater than the standard zone.
25	Under the guise of

transit-oriented development, the
expectation by the Town and
developers is that there will be a
reduction in traffic in the study
area. This expectation is
unfortunately misguided.

To begin with, the study area does not include any of the roads outside of the Town of Brookhaven. And while the project F35is literally on the border of the Town of Islip, this aspect has not been taken into consideration. part of this project, much of the commuter parking which is currently on the Town of Brookhaven side will become part of the development. This commuter parking is expected to transfer to the Islip side of Ronkonkoma train station, using land owned by Suffolk County adjacent to existing commuter parking. these studies have not included

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Special Town Board Meeting all the reduction of all the 2 F36 parking as per the developer's 3 Cont'd. plans and not providing enough The burden of commuter parking. 5 additional traffic will be borne 6 F37 by the residents of the hamlet of 7 8 Ronkonkoma. These are just a few of the 9 issues that we feel are aspects of 10 the development that is too large, 11 as well as being landlocked by 12 Long Island Rail Road tracks, 13 Ronkonkoma Station and the Town of 14 Islip. In response, we have been 15 told that the benefits to the Town 16 F38 of Islip and its residents will be a sewage treatment plan; however, 18 we say, "No amount of sewage 19 capacity will make up for the damage that this project will cause to the hamlet of Ronkonkoma."

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For these reasons, the Ronkonkoma Civic Association

Special Town Board Meeting cannot support the Ronkonkoma Hub project in its current form, and ask for your help in addressing our current concerns to the Town of Brookhaven.

A couple of other items
that Mr. Zapolski, Commissioner
Zapolski brought up was the
parking, and he noted that there
were 3,600 new parking spaces. In
that, 1,600 of which will be
dedicated to the new buildings,
the residential, and I guess 2,000

My comments F45 17 relative to traffic have been submitted to the Town of 18 Brookhaven, and I have asked that 19 the Final Impact Statement 20 21 incorporate appropriate mitigation 22 measures. 23 Last, originally the County considered constructing a sewage 24 F46 25 treatment plant to serve the Hub.

22	abatement; they are not going to
23	pay the full taxes.
